The view from the long curved trestle out toward a small valley bordering the property is really nice. I was impressed with the realistic way the signals work, and with the real working steam locomotives. Perhaps the only down side was that I was starting to get saddle sore from riding on the cars with wooden benches, so the padded seats on other cars were much appreciated."
