On July 9, 2002, the Museum took its first public step towards finding a new and permament home. SMVRHM made a preliminary presentation to the Santa Maria Recreation and Parks Commission proposing to occupy some combination of the buildings at 626 S. McClelland that the Rec

and Parks Department is in the process of leaving. The property anchors one end of what is fast becoming a cultural center of the City, and provides the potential of easy access to the rails of the downtown railroad yard that the property adjoins. Pictured above is an artist's rendering of how the renovation for the SMVRHM at that location might appear. The proposal was well received by the Commission who directed that the Recreation and Parks staff continue discussions with the SMVRHM about this project. rade on June 1, 2002. A 30-foot trailer carried a 1/8 scale Pacific Coast Railway (PCRy) train headed by a Pacific Coast electric locomotive. The consist included a PCRy boxcar and a passenger coach. Riding on the float were Cub Scouts from Pack 93, Den 3 that had visited the Museum last Fall.

gauge rail and the train itself.
